## Dear Friends,

I write this letter in October, but I am conscious that you will not read it till December. Prominent in the news at present is the Rohingya refugee crisis. More than half a million people have fled the destruction of their homes and persecution in the northern Rakhine province of Myanmar (Burma). They have risked death by sea or on foot in a bid to reach Cox's Bazaar - a district in Bangladesh. I have no doubt the crisis will still be ongoing by the time this is in your hands. However, the media may no longer may be focusing on the crisis and it may gradually fade from the public consciousness.

When their lives are threatened, people often seek refuge in another land. These Rohingya people are Muslims and they faced ethnic cleansing in Myanmar. They have fled who have burnt their villages and killed civilians. In recent years we have heard of refugees arriving in Europe, escaping from Syria and sailing across from Turkey into Greece or fleeing from parts of Africa and crossing from Libya into Italy.

Part of the Christmas story tells of how Joseph took the baby Jesus and his mother and fled from Judaea to seek refuge in Egypt. King Herod the Great wanted to kill the child who had been born to be "the King of the lews" and ordered his soldiers to kill all the boys of Bethlehem under the age of two. It is not a part of the Christmas story that we like. We tend to avoid it because it does not fit in with our light-hearted approach to the festive season with Christmas trees and fairy lights, parties and big meals, presents and Santa Claus. We are happy enough to hear about Christmas! the baby born in a stable because there was no room at the inn, the angel announcing news of his birth to shepherds in nearby fields

and a bright star guiding wise men from the east first to Jerusalem and later to Bethlehem, but please don't tell us about the threat to the Christ child's life or the slaughter of the innocent children.

However, the story is important because of from troops, backed by local Buddhist mobs, what we are told earlier in the narrative. Before Jesus was born, Joseph was told that his birth would fulfil a prophecy of Isaiah concerning a child to be called Immanuel, a name which means "God with us". We come to the heart of the Christmas message when we realise that with Jesus' birth God was entering our world in a quite unique way, coming alongside his people to share in their lives.

> That means God is with us in happy events such as our celebration of Christmas, but he is also with us in the less pleasant experiences, such as illness or sorrow. The world's attention may drift away from the Rohingya refugees, but God will still be with them. We may even forget about God, but he does not forget about us. We may lose our grip on God, but he still has a firm grasp of us!

## Finance Update

We are continuing to see a significant fall in receipts through both Freewill Offering (envelopes) and Standing Orders. Whereas 3 years ago, quarterly income from both sources was over £23,000 per quarter, it has now fallen to below £20,000. For the first 9 months of 2017, there has been an 11% fall compared with last year.

Problems never come singly. Following a recent inspection by our Insurers we have had to survey our complete electrical installation at a cost of £2,000, requiring a further £8,000 of work to be undertaken by early December and a further £20,000 of rewiring is required over the following year:

Do we have plenty of money in the bank?

Up to a point, we could access the funds if absolutely necessary. However, OSCR (the Charity Regulator) recommends that we should have 5 months of operating revenue in reserve - we only have 4 months' worth!

Our Reserve Fund currently stands at £47,000; £30,000 of electrical work would eradicate most of that! If that amount of money were to be taken out of the Reserve Fund, it would be very difficult to replace. Remember, problems never come alone – we may have some other unexpected expense just around the corner. We also have the expected expense of redecorating and some carpeting work at the manse, should a new minister arrive!

In the Spring Edition I asked if you could spare an additional 50p per week for the Church and I am most grateful to those who

have responded. Many of us are 'just about managing' these days, but for those of you who could afford a wee bit extra - please:

- Review your Standing Order when did you last change?
- Pop in that wee bit extra in your envelope
- If you are a taxpayer, or your spouse/partner
  in the same household is, and you have not
  signed a Gift Aid declaration, then please do
  so as soon as possible! Forms are available
  from the leaflet stand in the Lesser Hall.

#### Just a little by a lot will do a lot.
